ORGAN + CHOIR FESTIVAL:

A NIGHT OF THANKS & CELEBRATION

RECITAL REVIEW BY PAUL S. HESSELINK

The Southern Nevada Chapter of the American Guild of Organists closed out the 2018-2019 Organ Recital Series with an Organ and Choral Festival on Friday, June 7 at 7:30 P.M. in the Doctor Rando-Grillot Recital Hall in the Beam Music Center on the University of Nevada, Las Vegas campus. About 185 people were there to enjoy the program of organ and choral literature featuring two local choirs and four local AGO chapter members as organists.

Before the program began, Dean Steven R. Wright honored member Bruce Behnke for his twelve years of service as webmaster and editor of the chapter newsletter, The Desert Wind. Bruce was presented with a framed certificate acknowledging his contributions to the chapter, and a dining certificate to Flemings.

Diane Zapach, Director of Development for the College of Fine Arts at UNLV, gave the audience the good news that the Maurine Jackson Smith Endowment Fund for the Maintenance

of the Rudolf von Beckerath organ, named in Mrs. Smith's honor, has been fully subscribed, insuring that the instrument will be cared for in perpetuity. The endowment campaign will remain open until July 1 to allow anyone who wishes to be a part of the project to still be included on the plaque which will be hung at the entrance to the Doc Rando Recital Hall, and which will list the contributors to the endowment fund. Dr. Dorothy Young Riess opened the program with two works from the modern French organ repertory. The first of the two works was the sixth movement, *Joie et clarté des Corps Glorieux*, of Olivier Messiaen's 1939 organ cycle in seven movements, Les Corps Glorieux, in which he draws upon elements of Indian classical music and Gregorian chant.



The second milestone marks the transition of management of our recital series from Dr. Paul Hesselink to Kevin Coney and Christian Lentz.



CHAPTER HONORS BRUCE BEHNKE



At the opening of the June 7 Organ + Choir Festival, the chapter recognized Bruce Behnke for his commitment and service to the SNC:AGO as webmaster and as editor of the chapter's newsletter, the *Desert Wind*.

While serving on the board of the chapter, Bruce agreed to a "temporary" position writing, designing and editing the Desert Wind... that temporary position lasted twelve years.

Bruce is a retired music teacher. He has taught vocal and instrumental music in elementary, middle and high schools in Michigan, Colorado and Nevada. His last position was at the Las Vegas Academy where he taught music theory, modern music technology and beginning piano. He has also been a church choir director in each of these three states. While in Michigan he was associated with the Delta College Flute Choir. He has nine arrangements for flute and choir published by ALRY Publications. He will continue to serve on the SNC:AGO executive board.

The Desert Wind publishes five times a year and is distributed to chapter members, friends of the chapter, the national organization and various chapters around the region.

FESTIVAL ENDS RECITAL SEASON WITH ACCLAIM

The score was completed at the outbreak of World War II, and even though it has been a part of the organ repertory for exactly 70 years, it still sounds "fresh," and for the uninitiated, perhaps somewhat "difficult" to absorb.

This was followed by a more recent work by the French composer, Jacques Charpentier (1933-2017), L'ange a la Trompette, composed in 1954. In the prior three years to its composition, the composer had lived in India where he was influenced by Hindu music; he enrolled at the Paris Conservatory where he studied the philosophy of music with Olivier Messiaen. The style of Charpentier's composition played by Dr. Riess without interruption from the Messiaen work, has unmistakable stylistic qualities which are heard as a direct influence. While 25 years more recent than Messiaen's work, it is a slightly updated composition of Messiaen's ground-breaking style and worked well as paired with Joie et clarté des Corps Glorieux. Dr. Riess's performance of the two works was both powerful and stylish.

The recital continued with Barbara Finn's presentation of the first two movements of Paul Hindemith's Organ Sonata II, composed in 1937. While still 20th century in style, Hindemith's work seemed almost "traditional" compared to the Messiaen and Charpentier compositions. Identifiable melodies, less dissonant chord structures, and quartal harmonies (built on the interval of the 4th rather than the traditional triadic structures based on the interval of the 3rd) gave the sense of being more connected to traditional tonal harmonies of music's Common Practice Period. Ms. Finn's performance deftly highlighted a terraced dynamic plan in the first movement marked Lebhaft (lively), and the second movement, Ruhig bewegt (peacefully moving), was played with grace and calm.

The Hindemith was followed by two anthems sung by the Choir of St. Joseph, Husband of Mary; Ms. Finn accompanied at the organ. She has been the Music Director of the church since 2000; the choir was under the direction of Joseph Cruz. The first anthem was one of Twelve Sacred Songs by Dutch composer Jan Nieland (1903-1963). Magnificat was composed in 1941. The choir concluded with Hal Hopson's fine setting of Gustav Holst's hymn tune Thaxted, "O God Beyond All Praising."

Amy Homer Smith, organist at Green Valley Presbyterian Church, presented the formidable Fantaisie and Fugue in G Minor, BWV 542 by Johann Sebastian Bach.


Some people think no organ recital should be without Bach, so this work satisfied those who wanted something more traditional from the organ literature. This work has a dramatic free fantasy beginning which returns throughout the composition, interspersed with more contrapuntal sections in a more strict and straight-forward style. The fugue has a "merry" theme (in spite of its minor mode) which the composer gives his usual extensive workout. Kudos go to Amy for tackling this challenging work.

Members of the Choir at Green Valley Presbyterian Church, under the direction of Kaymen Carter, followed with Mark Hayes' transcendent setting of the beloved hymn, "The Old Rugged Cross," and Philip W. J. Stopford's arrangement of "Jesus Christ is Risen Again." Both anthems were accompanied by Mrs. Smith.

The evening's program concluded with Mary Beth Bennet's lush Chant Mystique for English horn and organ. (Ms. Bennett was the commissioned composer of a new organ work, Las Vegas Suite, for the Chapter's 2006 Western Regional AGO Convention held in Las Vegas. That work was premiered on that occasion.) Written in 2000, Chant Mystique, brought the evening's program to an exceptionally peaceful close. The superb English horn performer was Coreen Levin, and she was accompanied by Paul S. Hesselink at the organ.

Following the program, our organ technician, Christian Lentz, hosted members of the audience on stage for an up close look and demonstration of the von Beckerath organ. This has been a popular feature of the last three recitals with about 20 to 25 audience members taking advantage of the opportunity.

On June 7, during the Organ + Choir Festival, the chapter announced the naming of its annual concert series after long-term program director and concert organizer, Dr. Paul S. Hesselink.

The SNC:AGO has produced free fine arts concerts featuring the pipe organ for more than 50 years. During his fourteen-year tenure, Hesselink organized and produced 69 concerts: 13 by foreign artists, 35 by visiting American artists, and 21 recitals by chapter members. Under Hesselink's guidance, the series has grown in reputation and significance, attracting world renowned concert artists, as well as up-and-coming performers to Las Vegas.

Chapter Dean Steven R. Wright said, "Thanks to Paul's guidance and hard work, our concert series is one of the most sought after in the country. We don't have to work hard to recruit concert artists; they seek us out. They want to play Las Vegas, to be a part of what Paul has built here."

The adjunct professor of organ at UNLV since 1993, Hesselink played a major role in securing the university's Maurine Jackson Smith Organ in the Dr. Rando-Grillot Recital Hall within the Lee & Thomas Music Center. The instrument was completed in 2004 by Rudolf von Beckerath Orgelbau of Hamburg, Germany, and most of the concerts produced by Hesselink have been performed on this instrument.

After earning a Bachelor of Arts degree in organ at Hope College, Hesselink studied musicology under a Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship at University of Michigan. He completed the Master of Arts in organ pedagogy at Ohio State University and earned the Doctor of Musical Arts in organ performance at the University of Colorado, Boulder. Dr. Hesselink studied harpsichord in Paris with Davitt Moroney.

Hesselink was on the faculty of Longwood University for 26 years. He received two National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Fellowships for postgraduate study: in music theory (Yale), and Schoenberg studies (USC). Moving to Las Vegas in 1993, Hesselink began an affiliation with the Nevada School of the Arts as a board member, and as its dean for twelve years. He is a past-dean of the SNC:AGO and continues to serve on the organization's executive board.

Wright continued, "The recital series is our most important, most visible service to Southern Nevada. It fits in perfect alignment with the mission of the AGO and Paul has done an incredible job. Our executive board voted unanimously to give him this tribute and to recognize him for his years of wonderful leadership and contributions to its success."

RAYMOND BARNES MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

FIVE 2019 RECIPIENTS PREP FOR SEATTLE P.O.E.



The SNC:AGO is proud to announce its 2019 recipients of the Raymond J. Barnes Memorial Scholarship. The scholarship, named for the chapter's long-time dean, helps to support young musicians interested in studying the organ by underwriting their attendance at an AGO Pipe Organ Experience (POE), a week long summer camp for the organ.

This year's recipients will attend the Seattle Chapter POE from July 14-19 which will include daily organ lessons (one teacher for every two participants) as well as practice time. Other activities will include recitals, workshops, and master classes. Topics covered include registration, repertoire, hymn playing, choral accompanying, and improvisation. The faculty for the Seattle POE is made up of distinguished concert organists, university professors, and church musicians.

Students will stay at Seattle Pacific University and have access to and play these featured instruments: Fisk, III manuals, 62 ranks at Plymouth Congregational Church; Aeolian-Skinner, III manuals, 37 ranks at Seattle First Baptist Church; Wech Orgelbau, II manuals, 30 ranks at Queen Anne Lutheran Church; Fritts, II manuals, 36 ranks at Ascension Episcopal Church, and Bond, II manuals, 44 ranks at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church.

The scholarship funds each student's POE costs (registration and event fees, lodging, and meals) as well as their air travel.

The SNC:AGO will soon present a Young Artists Concert featuring these musicians. Details to be announced very soon.

CHAPTER PAYS IT FORWARD WITH LOAN OF DIGITAL ORGAN

A number of years ago, SNC:AGO member Doris Francis donated a digital instrument to Epiphany Episcopal Church in southeast Las Vegas. Earlier this year, the church installed a Rodgers 940 3-manual organ in their sanctuary and with the suggestion and urging of assistant director of music and SNC:AGO secretary, Kathi Colman, the church donated the previous instrument to the chapter.

As part of its mission to foster a thriving community of musicians who share their knowledge and inspire passion for the organ, the SNC:AGO loaned the instrument to an aspiring organist and one of our POE students, Brenna Schelin.

The loan allows Brenna to keep and practice on the instrument for five years, expiring at about the time that she will graduate from high school. Upon its return to the chapter, the SNC:AGO plans to once again lend the organ to another student organist.

SHRINE DEDICATES NEW ORGAN WITH MASS & CONCERT



During afternoon mass on Saturday, April 27, the Roman Catholic Shrine of the Most Holy Redeemer dedicated their new hybrid, digital organ with pipes.

Father Bob Stoeckig, Las Vegas Catholic Diocese Vicar General and Pastor of the Las Vegas Catholic Cathedral, presided with the assistance of Father Manuel Quintero, Rector of the Shrine.

The choir from St. Joseph Husband of Mary, directed by Joseph Cruz, joined with the Shrine choir, under the direction of Bob Grant, with Barbara Finn, organist. Barbara was the first organist to serve the Shrine when it opened in 1993.

Following the mass, the church presented an organ recital with William Vaughn, dean of the San Francisco chapter of the AGO. Vaughn is the Director of Music and School Music Teacher at Assumption Catholic Church in San Leandro, California.

William Vaughn's varied program was especially suited to showcasing the Rodgers digital & pipe hybrid instrument, including works registered specifically for the pipe work, to highlight the abilities of the digital voices and to demonstrate the power and grandeur of the pipes and digital voices in concert together.

In celebration of the day, Vaughn opened with the triumphant "Festival Alleluia" by Dan Miller, followed by Elgar's *Salut d'Amour*, the *Ronde Française* by Léon Boëllmann and *Marche-Sortie* by Théodore Dubois. He ended the first half of the recital with the *Adagio* from Mozart's Clarinet Concerto in A-Major.

One of the absolute highlights of the day occurred when Vaughn invited one of his students to the console. Twelve year old Tim Warncke performed an exuberant rendition of Bach's Prelude in C Major, S. 531... from memory. Warncke, a student at Assumption Catholic School, began his studies in organ about three years ago and also enjoys soccer, basketball, snowboarding and reading.

The second half of the recital included *Waltz* (Jazz Suite) by Shostakovich ...which was dedicated to the Shrine's operations director Merlyn Thompson, *Capriccio* (Sleeper's Awake) by Daniel Gawthrop and *Variations on St. Denio* (A Hymn Tune) by Hector Oliveria. This piece written for organ is a wonderful tour through the instrument's various voices. Vaughn concluded with *Lied* (Song) for Lent by James Aylward, based on a fitting Catholic theme, and finally *Festival Toccata on "St. Anne"* by Fred Swann.

The Organ: The instrument is a three manual Trillium Organ by Rodgers Instruments. It is the digital equivalent of 125 pipe ranks and includes 6 ranks of windblown pipe work: Montre 16' (TC), Principal 8', Gemshorn 8', Koppelflöte 8', Octave 4' and Flute 4'. The hybrid instrument has a specification of 131 organ voices and over 200 additional organ and non-organ samples both internally and externally through the MIDI system sound module, Rodgers MX200.

Design, installation and tonal finishing was accomplished by Dr. Robert Tall of Robert Tall and Associates (Palm Springs, CA); Robert Knight of Knight Pipe Organ Company (San Diego) and Christian Lentz of Christian Lentz Organ Services (Las Vegas).



JOWERS LEAVES CROWD WANTING TO GO BACH FOR MORE

RECITAL REVIEW BY PAUL S. HESSELINK

On Friday, March 29, organist Florence Jowers presented the fourth recital in the Southern Nevada Chapter's 2018-2019 Organ Recital Series at 7:30 P.M. in Dr. Arturo Rando-Grillot Recital Hall in UNLV's Beam Music Center.

Her program was designed to highlight organ works by J.S. Bach and composers Georg Böhm and Dieterich Buxtehude who influenced Bach and from whom he learned, and by Bach's "best" student Johann Ludwig Krebs. Bach was known to have referred to his student as "Die beste Krebe (crab) in die Bache (brook)." Jowers also included by extension, Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy, who played a seminal role in reintroducing the works of Bach to the public after years of neglect. The 2004 von Beckerath Maurine Jackson Smith Organ in Doc Rando Hall was an ideal vehicle for presenting her carefully chosen program.

Of the four selections by Bach on the program, three were relatively unfamiliar and only rarely programmed. Her performance of the double pedal chorale prelude "An Wasserflüssen Babylon" BWV 653b, one of Bach's most challenging for the performer chorale preludes, was fluid and elegant.

The virtually unknown *Chorale Fantasy for Organ on* "Wo Gott der Herr nicht bei us halt," BWV 1128 which followed, was rediscovered as recently as 2008 and is thought to have been composed between 1705 and 1710. The work "reflects the influence of the North German composers Buxtehude, Reinken, and Bruhns," thus neatly fitting into Ms. Jowers' recital theme, "Bach as Student and Teacher." The Bach *Prelude and Fugue in E Major*, BWV 566 is an early Bach work written between 1705-1706, probably during the time Bach made his famous

275-mile walk to hear Buxtehude in Lübeck. The work is in five sections and its compositional form resembles that of preludes by his mentor. The first section alternates manual or pedal cadenzas with dense suspended chords. The second is a charming fugue with much repetition following the circle of fifths. The third section is a brief flourish for manuals, ending with an even briefer pedal cadenza punctuated with nine-voice chords. The fourth section, in triple meter, is a second fugue with a rhythmic subject resembling the theme of the first fugue; it is immediately followed by the fifth and final section which opens with a virtuoso pedal-solo.

In the Buxtehude Chaconne in E Minor, BuxWV 160, Ms. Jowers showed off many colors of the organ by finding suitable but subtle secondary sounds for each repeat of the second four measures of the eight-measure theme. The Krebs Trio in F Major virtually sparkled, and including the Krebs Fugue in B-flat Major, based on the B-A-C-H motive, was an artful touch to underline the theme of the recital. While much of the literature on the recital was relatively "unknown" or less familiar than the usual Bach works we are accustomed to hearing, Ms. Jowers' performance of the final work on the program, the Prelude and Fugue in B Minor, BWV 544, was an electrifying and familiar conclusion to a thoughtfully-planned and extremely well-performed and satisfying program.

Ms. Jowers, currently the Director of Music at Christ Lutheran Church in Staunton, Virginia, has recently retired as Professor Emerita from Lenoir-Rhyne University in Hickory, North Carolina, where she taught organ and church music for nineteen years. At her church in Virginia she plays each week an organ built by the Taylor-Boody Organbuilding firm; George Taylor apprenticed with the Rudolf von Beckerath Orgelbau of Hamburg, Germany, the firm which built the organ at UNLV. Ms. Jowers at age 14 began studying organ at and later attended Stetson University in DeLand, Florida where there are six von Beckerath organs on the campus.





OUR CHAPTER

EUGENE FEHER WAS WELL KNOWN PIANIST, ORGANIST, COMPOSER AND SNC:AGO CHARTER MEMBER



Eugene Feher came to Las Vegas in 1962 for a quick gig at the Sultan's Table at The Dunes, but the unmatched beauty and potential of Southern Nevada helped him decide to make Las Vegas his home.

Feher was born into an esteemed musical family in Brooklyn, NY and quickly showed his prodigy-like abilities on the piano, winning interborough competitions by the age of nine. He was skilled at piano, organ, violin and even conducted. Feher graduated valedictorian of his high school and earned a fellowship and degree from Julliard.

His postgraduate work at USC was interrupted by wartime service in the Army Air Corp. He served as a music arranger for a variety of military radio programs which put him in contact with a variety of Hollywood writers, stars and musicians.

After the war, Feher completed his masters in musicology at USC and then went to concertizing and working for the movie studios. Feher played extensive amounts of background piano (and some harpsichord) music in films and on scores and sound tracks. He even had a run as an

assistant director for Columbia Pictures. Feher was the pianist for a long list of Hollywood celebrities (James Darren, Shelley Winters, Ricardo Montelban, Burl Ives) and in a June 1969 feature story in the *Las Vegas Sun*, he reminisced about his time working with Rita Hayworth, Jean Peters (Mrs. Howard H. Hughes) and Marilyn Monroe.

While in Las Vegas, Feher served as the organist and musical director for Temple Beth Sholom. He continued to compose and arrange music, performed with the Las Vegas symphony and was a frequent recitalist and accompanist.

Eugene Feher passed away unexpectedly on Saturday, June 27, 1970. He was just 45 years old.

There are a few surviving recordings of Feher's playing: some movie scores (like the *Big Gamble/Treasure of the Golden Condor* and *Dr. Seuss's The 5,000 Fingers of Dr. T*) and a few LP recordings in the Library of Congress collection (example: *Joachim Chassman, violinist, with Eugene Feher at the piano. LB. no. 416*). A number of his compositions (including his U.S. Constitution set to music) survive as well.
