Dean's Notes

On Friday evening, October 12, Chapter members and guests from the community gathered at United University Methodist Church to celebrate the Legacy of Charles Wesley by commemorating his 300th birthday. Wesley authored nearly 9,000 religious poems of which more than 6,500 were true hymn texts and which were published in his lifetime! Friday evening's well-planned program used only Charles Wesley hymn texts. The 40-voice Charles Wesley Festival Choir under the expert direction of Marshall Townsend, organist Margaret Hannah, trumpeter Tom Wright and the singing of the assembled congregation combined to make it an exciting occasion. The Reverend Mark W. Lansberry of Trinity United Methodist Church read a biography of Charles Wesley, prepared by Dr. Paul Hesselink and offered a prayer of thanksgiving for the life of this remarkable poet. Dean Shireen Beaudry-Johnson read the amusing "Directions for Singing" from John Wesley's Select Hymns, 1761. Included were the instructions (still valid today!): "Sing lustily and with a good courage; beware of singing as you were half dead or half asleep; sing modestly, do not bawl; whatever time is sung, be sure to keep with it; above all, sing spiritually." The two parts of the program outlined "Christ's Gracious Life" and "The Response of the Christian." Margaret Hannah had chosen and worked out wonderful accompaniments to the hymns. Her performance of Robert Hobby's five variations on "O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing" with Nathan van Arsdale reading the verses between the variations was stunning. Chaplain Bede Parry led the congregation in the reading of the Wesley text "Blest Be the Dear Uniting Love," which served as the closing benediction. The whole hour was spiritually refreshing and uplifting for me personally, and from the reactions I heard from others, for the rest of the audience as well. Thanks to Margaret and Paul for their detailed planning of this event.

One of the main goals of the Guild is to encourage excellence in performance in organ and choral works. Excellent it was, making me reflect on the power of music presented on this occasion. Howard Ferguson, Dean of the Central Arizona Chapter, AGO relates a similar experience recently at the installation service of their new officers, and I quote some of his thoughts from his letter in their October 2007 Newsletter:

"For centuries people have been aware of the power of music. Popes have decried it or embraced it, depending on their place in time. Scientists have studied it intensely, yet can find no biological reason for the necessity of it. Musicians are probably more aware of its power than most. However, almost all are aware of its highest power when performed with excellence. Think back to those musical experiences that stand out in your mind, those that made your heart leap, your eyes close slightly, your mind strain to hear those notes that have long since faded. It is hard to quantify what defines quality and excellence.... quality cannot be defined, and our perceptions of it are learned from experience....quality is the fundamental force stimulating all in the universe. 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MUSIC, SHE WROTE; A MINI-SERIES ON COMPOSITIONS BY WOMEN

Frances Nobert, D.M.A.

Introduction: Although there are many fine compositions in print, it seems that organ music by women is rarely heard in liturgical or concert settings. This mini-series is ntended to provide information and to encourage organists to explore this body of literature. It has been my experience that congregations and audiences have been surprised, intrigued and enthusiastic after hearing preludes, interludes, postludes and concert pieces composed by women.

Part One: Service Music for Fall, Thanksgiving, Advent and Christmas

The following two- to six- page compositions are appropriate for prelude, communion or postlude. Most are of moderate difficulty and are playable on instruments of various sizes. Asterisks indicate alternate hymn harmonizations by Emma Lou Diemer, Karen Keene and Janet Linker.

Fall and Thanksgiving

Emma Lou Diemer. *Seasonal Psalms for Organ, Volume II* (*Psalm 65*, based on the tune *Nun danket alle Gott* by Johann Crüger). The sacred Music Press 70/1259 S.

Emma Lou Diemer. Seasonal Psalms for Organ, Volume II (Psalm 149 for All Saints' Day).

Alice Jordan. *The Alice Jordan Collection: Hymn Tunes for Organ* (*Dialogue for Thanksgiving*, based on the Netherlands folk hymn *Kremser*). McAfee Music DM 00261

Kristina Langlois. *3 Hymns of Thanksgiving* (*Blessing and Honor, Let All Things Now Living and New Songs of Celebration*). Morning Star MSM 10-721

Emily Maxson Porter. *Five Hymn Preludes of Fall* (*Dix*, *Kirken den et Gammelt Hus*, *Lasst uns erfreuen*, *Lobe den Herren and Nun danket all*). MorningStar MSM 10-713. With the exception of the lengthy, quiet For the Beauty of the Earth, the rousing works would be suitable for either opening or closing voluntary. The hymn tune appears once in each setting and is accompanied with stirring accompaniments. Three of the compositions call for Trumpet en chamade to bring out a fanfare or a tenor melody. Porter indicates registrations throughout.

0145 01. Bate has created an introduction and five variations on this well-known melody. The entire composition or portions thereof would be appropriate as a prelude for the Sundays in Advent, for communion or as a concert number.

Nancy Plummer Faxon. *Divinum from A Christmas Celebration*. MorningStar MSM 10-104. The two-page setting features quiet triadic harmonies in the right hand against the flute melody in the left hand. A brief interlude precedes the second entry of the melody in the pedal.

Nancy Plummer Faxon. *A Christmas Prelude* from *A Christmas Celebration*. MorningStar MS 10-104. Plummer fashions a lovely, effective-four-page composition with the melody of *Stille Nacht*

loosely incorporated. The rhythm of the familiar carol occurs throughout the quiet work.

Sandra Gay. *Christmas Postlude* from the cantata, *Tidings of Great Joy*, Zimbel Press #151. The three-page, easy work includes *Vom Himmel Hoch, God Rest You Merry Gentlemen* and *Tempest Adest Floridum*, Except for the final seven measures, the pedal has long notes for the cantus firmus of Vom Himmel Hoch. Gay indicates the registration for a two-manual instrument. The composition would be an excellent postlude for a service on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day.

Sandra Gay. *Footnotes Vol. III: Christmas Carols for Organ* (pedals alone). Zimbel Press #Z142. The volume contains settings of Vom Himmel Hoch, In Dulci Jubilo, Stille Nacht, Coventry Carol, Personent Hodie and Still, Still. Each one-page composition includes double pedal and some chords.

Alice Jordan. A Season and A Time" Organ Preludes: General, Christmas, Easter, Lord's Supper (Pastorale on an Austrian Carol, "As Lately We Watched;" Arioso on a German Carol, "Still, Still, Still;" Four Familiar nativity Melodies; All My Heart This Night Rejoices, Silent Night and two settings of Away in a Manger). Broadman Press 4570-37.

Karen Keene. Fantasy on "Tempus Adest Floridum" Gentle Mary Laid Her Child, Good King Wenceslas and Spring has Now Unwrapped the Flowers) MorningStar MS 10-158

For each brief section she has provided a one- or two-sentence program note. The variations might be played individually, as a group of several, or in entirety.

Margaret Verdell Sandresky. *Organ Music, Volume II, Solo Organ* (*Variations on "Morning Star*") Edited by Virginia L. Haisten. wayne Leupold Editions WL 600032.

Eleanor Whitsett. *In dulci jubilo: For Faces of a Folksong*. MorningStar MSM 10-154. This work was commissioned for the Region VII Convention of the AMerican Guild of Organists, June 2003. The four movements of the moderately easy, thirteen-page composition are *Announcement; Christ is born; Shepherds, Haste!; Lullaby* and *Dance of Joy*. Each piece might be performed separately or as part of the whole for a church service or in a concert.

Epiphany

Emma Lou Diemer. *Seasonal Psalms for Organ, Volume I* (*Psalm 72*, based on the tune *Puer nobis* by Michael Praetorius). The delightful and lively five-page work is for manuals except for the final, quiet section. It would be an excellent prelude, especially if the first hymn might employ the same tune. The Sacred Music Press 70/1258 S.

Brenda Durden.: *Vol. 2: Hymn Arrangements for Advent, Christmas and Epiphany*. These settings are the straight hymns with the melody in soprano, alto, tenor or bass. Pub. Durden.

*Janet Linker. The Last Verse for Christmas: Fifteen Free Hymn Accompaniments for the Christmas Season (We Three Kings). The setting begins in E minor and modulates to F minor for the final stanza. Beckenhorst OC16.

Janet Linker. *Three Epiphany Pieces* (As with Gladness Men of Old; Brightest and Best are the Stars of the Morning; We Three Kings). Of the moderately easy three- to four-page compositions, the first would be an excellent postlude, while the others would be lovely preludes. Augsburg Fortress 11-10974.

Emily Maxson Porter. *Bright and Glorious: Four Organ Chorale Preludes for the Epiphany Season* (*Bright and Glorious is the Sky, Brightest and Best of the Stars of the Morning; We Three Kings of Orient Are; How Good, Lord, to be Here*). The four- to six-page settings would be charming preludes, especially the jazzy version of We Three Kings. The catchy rhythms require practice, but the results are worth the effort. *June Nixon. *Final Flourish: Two Hundred Last Verse Arrangements of Familiar Hymn Tunes* (*Caithness, Carlisle, Dix, Dundee, Puer nobis, Salzburg, Stuttgart and Wareham*). Nixon's collection contains excellent settings, many with a choice of two keys. The different harmonies are intriguing but never intrusive. Kevin Mayhew 1400108.

June Nixon. *Organ Miniatures: 200 Short Improvisations on Familiar Hymn Tunes* (*Caithness, Carlisle, Dix, Dundee, Salzburg, Stuttgart and Wareham*). The one- and two-page compositions might be played as hymn introductions, interludes or postludes. Some have the choice of two keys. Kevin Mayhew 1400196.

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Frances Nobert is College Organist and Professor Emerita of Music at Whittier College in Whittier, California. She is also serving as Region IX Councillor and as the Convener of Regional Councillors for the American Guild of Organists.

Dr. Nobert may be heard on Organ Historical Society's recordings of the Organs of Maine and on the Raven label release, Music, She Wrote: Organ Compositions by Women.

Late in 1705, J.S. Bach walked from Arnstadt to hear the famed organist, Buxtehude at St. Mary's Church in Lübeck, a distance of 450 kilometers(280 miles). You won't have to walk nearly that far to hear some of this composer's fantastic music which had such an influence on the young Bach. Bach had an approved leave of absence for four weeks from his church post in Arnstadt but stayed in Lübeck four times that length of time, and was "in trouble" when he finally did return. He may have been offered the elderly Buxtehude's job, certainly the most prestigious church position in all of Germany. Come to the recital and learn what may have caused Bach to think better of accepting it!

These exams are great goals to work towards, even if it just means another certificate on the wall!



PIPES IN THE DESERT – FEATURED PERFORMERS AND VENUES
