FIFTH ANNUAL ADVENT / CHRISTMAS RECITAL

The Numbers are In!

Nearly 200 people attended the chapter's Fifth Annual Advent / Christmas Organ Recital on Sunday, December 7 in Doc Rando Hall on the UNLV campus. Here are some of the findings from the questionnaire members of the audience completed after the recital.

About half of the audience (97) attendees completed the questionnaire (48.7%) providing a healthy sample for survey. The data collected from the questionnaires after each recital provides valuable information which is helpful in preparing grant applications. Here are some of the results from this program:

For 52 respondents (53.6 %), this was their first attendance at one of our AGO recitals. Of those 52 attending an AGO recital for the first time, 35 were visiting Doc Rando for the first time, and 48 of them had never heard the Maurine Jackson Smith organ before.

How did people learn of the recital?

16 by e-mail notification (16.5%)

9 by seeing a flyer (9.3%)

8 from newspapers (8.2%)

10 from radio (10.3%)

4 from a previous program listing (4.1%)

32 from a friend (33%)

17 other---our website, online, from a teacher, cultural guide, church (17.5%)

Once again, "from a friend" continues to be the number 1 most effective way to get the word out about our recitals.

As to what works on the program the respondents particularly enjoyed, every performer was specifically mentioned, and quite a number indicated they enjoyed all the pieces. Here is the breakdown of how people felt about the program:

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48 "I loved it!" (49.5%)
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38 "I liked it a lot" (39.2%)

8 "I found it interesting (8.2%)

3 "I might come back for another performance (3.1%)

0 checked "I wasn't really interested," or "I wouldn't come again."

Overall rating of the recital:

- 34 Superb (35.1%)
- 54 Excellent (55.7%)
- 5 Average (5.2%)
- 2 Fair (2.1%)
- 2 no rating (2.1%)



We gathered 41 new e-mail addresses from respondents who wished to be notified / reminded of future organ recitals.



She taught music classes at Illinois Central College, directing bands and various choirs, and also sang in a Barbershop quartet all the while performing as an organist/pianist for many church congregations. She was an active member of many music teachers associations and served as the Head of the Music Teachers Association of Alaska while living in Fairbanks from 1990 to 2001. Carol and Dick then moved to Las Vegas where Carol loved the excitement, playing video poker and the many opportunities for her music business. Everywhere she lived; she made long lasting friendships and shared her enthusiasm for life. She and Dick enjoyed various cultures and lands that they experienced in their travels around the world.

ORGAN RECITAL TO FEATURE DON HANNAH'S

Variations on "Aberwystwyth"

On Sunday, February 8, 2009 at 4:00 P.M. at Doc Rando Recital Hall on the UNLV campus, member Paul Hesselink will present a Faculty Recital on the Maurine Jackson Smith Memorial Organ. The recital is free and open to the public.

Featured on the recital will be the World Premiere of Don Hannah's "Variations on Aberwystwyth." Don had been working on this composition during the last year of his life. It is his only work for the organ and was his last completed composition. The piece has four movements: Theme, Chaconne, Canonus Interruptus and Toccata. Don, a legend in his own time as arranger/composer par excellence, was married to chapter member Margaret Hannah and was a regular attendee at our chapter events.

The recital will also present Bernard Sander's "Ornament of Grace," the winner of the AGO's competition for a new work for organ and a C-instrument. The composition was chosen to celebrate the International Year of the Organ. An extremely lush and beautiful work, "Ornament of Grace" can be performed with violin, oboe, or B-flat clarinet and is a useful and welcome addition to the repertoire. An ensemble of advanced violin students from the Nevada School of the Arts will be featured as the soloists for this performance.

In addition, the program will include works by Nicolas Bruhns, François Couperin, Johannes Brahms and the contemporary Dutch composer, Bert Matter.

ELISABETH ROLOFF, organist

Internationally acclaimed organist Elisabeth Roloff had been engaged to perform on our 2008-2009 Organ Recital Series on Thursday, March 26, 2009. Her appearance in Las Vegas was to have been after a performance at Arizona State University in Tempe on the previous Sunday and a performance at St. Thomas Church in New York City the following Sunday.

On December 2 we received notification from Ms. Roloff's manager, Monica Fallon, that Ms. Roloff had been diagnosed with cancer and the necessary treatments and recovery would necessitate the cancellation of her recital in Las Vegas and her tour to the U.S. I responded to Ms. Fallon:

We are sorry to hear of Ms. Roloff's illness. We had looked forward to her visit and recital in Las Vegas. Please express to her our deep concern and our prayers for her complete recovery.

On December 15 Monica Fallon informed us:

With sad heart I tell you that organist Elisabeth Roloff is no longer among us. She passed away yesterday, after struggling against forces much stronger than she could overcome. She had spent the last weeks with her family in Germany, who were at her side during the treatments. We will miss her joyful laughter, her beautiful music and her optimism. May the memory of her inspired energy always remain with us.

Born in Bielefeld, Germany in 1937, Elisabeth Roloff was recognized internationally as an outstanding concert organist. She performed in many important cathedrals, churches and concert halls in Europe, including the Royal Festival Hall in London and Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris, as well as in the United States, South America and Mexico. She recorded several CD's: "Christmas Organ Music," "Bach Throughout the Liturgical Year," "Jerusalem, Thou High Built City," and "Organ Landscape Jerusalem" (a fascinating documentary of six organs in Jerusalem).

After graduating from the Hochschule für Musik in Cologne, Ms. Roloff continued her studies with Ralph Downes at the Royal College of Music in London. When she was based in Paris from 1974-1982, she was the "Organiste Titulaire" of the German Church and studied French music with Marie-Claire Alain.

Elisabeth Roloff performed in Israel regularly as a recitalist as well as with Israel's leading orchestras. At the time of her death, she was the organist and choir director at the Redeemer Church in the Old City, Jerusalem where she presided over a 1972 Karl Schuke (Berlin) of 21 stops in a clear and resonant acoustic setting. Organ recitals have been held at her church since the installation of the organ, and the church has gained renown as the church "where the music is." She was also a faculty member of the Jerusalem Rubin Academy of Music. She had lived in Israel for the last 30 years.

Music reviewer Pamela Hickman, in a recent issue of "Living in Harmony," the magazine for Cultural Events in Israel wrote:

Elisabeth Roloff passed away December 14th, after finally losing her brave battle with illness. I had the privilege of attending and reviewing Elisabeth's last recital in Jerusalem in May 2008 at the Redeemer Church. Before the concert, I went up to the organ loft to wish her a good evening and found her looking radiant and elegant. From the minute the concert began, the joy and brilliance she conveyed could only be matched by her choice of interesting works, her total control of the instrument and her good taste.

Despite failing health, Elisabeth played seven concerts in different European cities and towns this past summer. With her passion for music and fine performance, there was never any question of her giving up. She was so modest and quietly spoken when you met her, but at the organ she was inspiring in her control and sense of color.

Elisabeth will be sadly missed by so many. Her personality and musicianship have been a great inspiration to musicians, listeners and to her friends.
