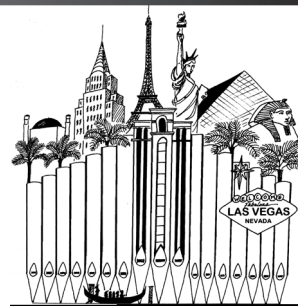

Over the past four months, my main parish, Saint Anthony of Padua Catholic Church, has been running a capital campaign for money to build our church/offices. The priests comment each time they raise the money issue as to how unfortunate and ill-timed is the building project when the economy is so weakened and people's financial lives are so challenged. But what actually has occurred is that the people are contributing to the building fund as if the economy is as robust as before the recession. Why is that? I think it's because they see the great good to be achieved by having our own church facility rather than being nomads, celebrating Mass and Sacraments in a CCSD school. We are all ready to be in our new Faith home.

Because of this parochial experi-

Since our convention in 2006, we have continued to present each year a concert series that draws more and more people to be fans of the pipe organ and to be discriminating concert-goers. Our outreach has more than quadrupled, as seen by the number of e-mails that go out before each concert. I do not want to return to the days where almost no one came to an organ recital.

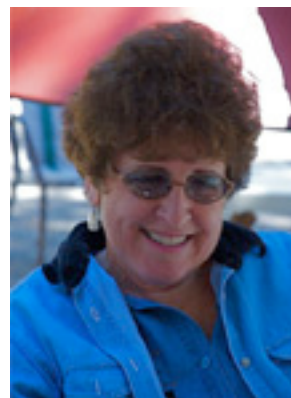

“Variations on Aberwystwyth” scheduled to be heard on PipeDreams

You may recall that the late Don Hannah composed his first (and only) work for the organ after a little goading from me. When John Karl Hirten suggested a workshop for the Southern Nevada Chapter in January, 2008 on the topic “Compositions for the Organ by Las Vegas Composers,” I was surprised to learn that during 50 years of marriage to Margaret, a fine organist and member of our chapter, Don had not written a single note for her instrument. Over the next several months preceding the workshop, Don’s response to my challenge was a set of variations on the hymntune “Aberwystwyth.” I had assumed that Margaret would play the piece at the workshop, but when I casually spoke about her doing that, Margaret said, “Oh, no! I’ve been married to this man for more than 50 years and I want to stay married to him!” She was adamant about that! Since I had sort of started the whole thing, I realized that I would likely have to learn the piece and so began work on it and did play it on the January workshop.

In early fall when I began to plan a faculty recital at UNLV, I thought I would ask Don whether he would agree to an official premier performance of the work on the recital scheduled for February 2009. He graciously agreed to my request, and I think also was pleased I wanted to perform the piece. He continued to work on little refinements and changes (I learned later that this “tinkering” with his compositions was typical). In October I had planned to go to the EROI Conference at Eastman in Rochester, New York; before I left for Rochester Don called and left me a message that he’d like to get together to work through a few of the little adjustments he was making. I called back and Margaret said, “You just missed him---he went out the door a few minutes ago.” So I left the message with Margaret that I couldn’t meet with him at any of his suggested times because I would be out of town, but I would call Don when I returned from the EROI Conference. When I

did return to Las Vegas I was saddened to learn that while I was gone he had died suddenly. Our meeting was destined never to take place.

The week of the faculty recital I had arranged with Ian Mylchreest of KNPR to do an interview to be aired on the program “State of Nevada” as a sort of preview and teaser for Don’s composition I was performing. That interview was eventually archived on the station’s website. Apparently, Michael Barone, host of the syndicated program “PipeDreams,” has the “Google” feature on his computer set to advise him whenever anything having to do with organ music

appears on the web. We think that Michael listened to the archived interview and then wrote to Dave Becker, Programming Director of KNPR, asking whether the premiere performance had been recorded. It just so happened that I had asked our chapter member Dorothy Riess to record the recital, so was able to supply the Program

Director a copy of Don’s recorded work which he sent off to Michael Barone. Attending a lecture-recital at UNLV I encountered Jay Bartos, in charge of Community Events web listings for KNPR. We were chatting and he said, “I see that you are scheduled to perform on one of our programs.” I was a bit puzzled and then after a few questions learned that it was PipeDreams!

77th Birthday Recital

The Music Ministry Concert Series of First Christian Church, 101 S. Rancho Dr., Las Vegas, will present Associate Organist, Dorothy Young Riess, M.D., in her 77th Birthday Celebration Organ Recital on Sunday, May 17, 2009, at 4:00 PM. In addition to music by Buxtehude, Bach, Mendelssohn, Reger and Dupre she plans a tribute to her father, Roy Wallace Young, concert violinist (1875-1959). She will perform the world premiere of his “Canzonetta” arranged for organ from the original orchestral score of his First Symphony. Also included are her arrangements of two of her father’s favorite violin solos, Fritz Kreisler “Liebesfreud” (Love’s Joy), and Paganini “24th Caprice” (for pedals alone). Bach Birthday Bash at the Bigler’s held on Saturday, April 18

A small group of Bach aficionados converged at the home of Scott and Jan Bigler to celebrate the 324th birthday of Johann Sebastian Bach. Appropriately, there were fourteen ($B-2 + A-1 + C-3 + H-8 = 14$) members and their guests who arrived with assorted contributions to the tasty potluck repast.

The event was also an occasion to showcase the many changes to the pipe organ in the Bigler home. Starting out originally as a 3-rank Moller of 2-manuals and pedal, the instrument has now grown to 11 ranks and 3-manuals and pedal (a 12th rank, a 16’ pedal bombarde, is waiting to be installed). Jan and Scott with the help of organ builder Richard Wallace have invested much effort and many hours to bring the organ to its present state of completion. (While there are still things to finish, one suspects that the instrument may continue to “change” into the foreseeable future!) Voicing of the instrument has been intentionally developed to be “gentle” in order not to overpower the performer and listeners in the space.

Six chapter members performed on the program which opened with a piano duet written for Jan when she was 12 years old---”Not-So-Symphonic Variations Bon on a natalis dies” composed in 1966 by William Blanchard. Jan provided the following background on the piece:

We lived in Claremont, Calif. from 1965-1968. My mother took organ lessons from William Blanchard (mom later told me he had a crush on her!) I hung out with her occasionally and one time went to Blanchard’s house. He somehow knew it was my birthday and he gave me the arrangement of Happy Birthday for my 12th. Mom and I sight-read it at his house and it became a family regular for everyone’s birthdays. Paul Hesselink was conscripted to read the primo part with Jan playing the secundo. The organ selections heard and their performers included:

 Prelude and Fugue in D Minor, BWV 539 - Paul Hesselink
 O Mensch beweine deine Sünde gross, BWV 622 (Orgelbüchlein) - Jan Bigler
 Erschienen ist der herrliche Tag, BWV 629 (Orgelbüchlein) – Cherrie Hoeft

The program Jan prepared for the occasion, was headed “First Annual Bach Birthday Bash.” We can all look forward to a delightful “second annual” event next year celebrating Bach’s 325th!
